*"The true man of God is heartsick, grieved at the worldliness of the Church, grieved at the toleration of sin in the Church, grieved at the prayerlessness in the Church. He is disturbed that the corporate prayer of the Church no longer pulls down the strongholds of the devil." – Leonard Ravenhill*

It was a Saturday night in our church kitchen, when I finally had a chance to relax and talk to my dad uninterrupted for an extended period of time. My parents are wonderful grandparents, and so, when they visit, their time is almost completely eaten up by my children (We love this, as do the boys, and my parents... even if I'm sure they are worn out by the time they leave!) As I began to talk to my father, without anyone else around, I found myself able to have a conversation we used to have all of the time: a real heart to heart talk about our walks with God. This isn't to say we don't talk about our walks, we do- but there is only so deep you can get when you are trying to connect via text, or, in person with little people trying to hit you with lightsabers. My dad always asks the same question, "How's your prayer life?"

*For the child of God, there is no greater indication of one's walk with the Lord than an honest evaluation of one's prayer life. When we pray, we acknowledge our humble state. We also acknowledge God's holiness, power, and loving kindness towards us.*

My father asks this question, always, in the context of his inquiry into God's ministry through me. As I reflect upon our conversation in the kitchen, I am challenged by the fact that my dad has never asked me the sort of questions pastors are prone to being asked: "How large is the congregation you serve?" "Are you growing?" "What new evangelism program are you trying?" And the reason he never asks these questions is revealing: because those questions don't ultimately reveal the health of one's walk with the Lord. Churches can swell in attendance without honoring God (I am convicted by the line that *you can always fill a stadium for a concert*), and evangelism is only effective if it is God's power at work through the believer. And how do believers tap into that power? Through dynamic prayer! In fact, Leonard Ravenhill once quipped, "Any method of evangelism will work if God is in it!"

As God's children, set apart for a mission, it is imperative that we don't get caught up in defining our relationship with God based on secondary standards. We should not become discouraged if we aren't seeing overwhelming or instant results in our labor for the Lord. Likewise, we should never say, "I am a healthy Christian because I have been attending the same church for X amount of years" or "I am being effectively used by God because the class I teach is growing." Those are wonderful things, in and of themselves, but, they aren't the standard. Jesus said to abide in Him, and we would bear much fruit. As you read this article, I want to challenge you with the simple question my father asks me: How's your prayer life?
