On Sunday, June 24<sup>th</sup> Indian Creek Baptist Church celebrated its 175<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. This celebration concluded a wonderful, months-long process by members of our *175<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Planning Committee*, Marlyn Dull, Patty Dull, Pam Hughes (Chairwoman), Debbie Kooser, myself, Jan Show, Patty Show, and

Bonita Warrick. Months before, we had begun meeting with a wealth of information in front of us. We wrestled with questions such as the following:

How does a church celebrate such an anniversary in an appropriate manner? What have other churches done? How can we pack as much information as possible into this celebrate?

I am proud of the work of our *Planning Committee*. Our hard work resulted in us gaining new information. For instance, Bonita Warrick did a lot of research on the Hickman Chapel. Patty Dull was able to find out exactly when *The Jersey Church* sent out a church planting team to Indian Creek (1798). These were valuable pieces of information that had been lost to history, only to be rediscovered by our committee.

Marlyn Dull was able to provide a lot of information about previous minsters, ministries, and musical groups. One of the most memorable parts of our ceremony was his brother Gorman sharing heart-felt testimonies about those who served the Lord faithfully in this ministry through the exercising of their musical gifts.

Patty Show shared many pictures, stories, and worked hard with others to put together beautiful displays within the church to add dramatic visual evidence of the ministry's history.

Jan Show provided a great deal of historical information about our community. How did we become *Indian Creek Baptist Church?* What did our community look like when we were first founded? -These were the sorts of questions that Jan answered through his research.

Pam Hughes, whose mother served as Church Clerk before her, was able to provide a wealth of historical documents to add insight into how ICBC has operated throughout the years. We were able to see how previous generations within this church have done as much as possible to reach others with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Pam, as our Chairwoman, helped to shape the vision for our celebration.

Due to technological advances, we were able to preserve pictures and historical documents for future generations. Many images are available on our church website, icbcmillrunpa.com, under the "gallery" tab. Hopefully, future generations will be able to use our research as a starting point for their celebrations (should the Lord tarry). In addition, we were able to compile all of this information into a 28-page booklet about ICBC's history. If you would like a copy of this booklet, please contact the church. In addition to collecting information (every member of our committee provided a wealth of information and helped us decide what to do with all of the information/images we received), our committee worked hard to make sure that this celebration would be one to remember. Debbie Kooser's excellent work on the commemorative wooden ornaments ought to be commended. They are a beautiful keepsake that will be cherished for generations. I would like say "thank you" to all who contributed to the booklet and slideshow. There are so many who were not a part of our committee who added information, pictures, etc. who provided valuable historical items. The 175<sup>th</sup> Celebration could not have been successful without your hard work. Thank you to all who traveled to be with us: from guests, to those who sung (Our choirs and the Country Churchmen), to ministers who participated in the service (Rev. Dr. Jeff Johnson, Rev. Dr. Gary Dull, Rev. Charles Bowser, Rev. Don Bowser, and Rev. Tom Hawkins).

That is why the Vanga Hospital in the Congo will build classrooms to provide an environment where students learn to become midwives. Missionary nurse, Kathy Rice will manage this project.

The Calendar Party was a great success. We had tables that were decorated with: flamingos, Kentucky Derby, Gardening, Sunflowers, Breast Cancer Awareness, Hummingbirds, Scriptures, Vintage toys, Thanksgiving. We had many local businesses provide donations and door prizes. We also had many craft items made by members of the church. Our food this year was barbecue sandwiches, chips, cookies and other individual table foods.

We were able to raise \$2000. Our Mission Committee and Couples SS Class gave donations toward our total.

# **Greetings from Mill Run and Thank You**

Our amazing church history can really spark both imagination and appreciation for God's faithfulness and for dedicated leaders and servants. The Turkeyfoot Baptist Church, or 'Old Jersey Church', founded in 1775, had folks who were interested in spreading the Gospel of Christ to nearby communities. They have documented that in 1798 they sent their pastors to 'Indian Creek Settlement', later renamed Mill Run, to preach. Now begins my wondering... Did our history really begin then? Did families follow through and organize the beginnings of our church in their homes? Did some folks at Turkeyfoot have family members or friends at Indian Creek Settlement? Probably. I can imagine the pastors from Turkeyfoot on horseback, with Bibles in their saddle-bags, coming here with love and concern, and more importantly, truth of the Gospel. How wonderful!

We officially organized in 1843, so we count our 175<sup>th</sup> anniversary from that year. But our history begins many years prior. When I talked with the secretary from Turkeyfoot Baptist Church, Nancy Mitchell, and asked if the present congregation, now relocated into the town of Confluence, is descended from the 1775 congregation, she said, "Yes we are." I was over-whelmed with the great faithfulness of our God. We celebrate so much this year.
