From the Desk of Pastor Chris

Where are You?

Several years ago, a short article made its way around the internet, and was shared by a few of my friends. The article is entitled 10 Things Pastors Hate to Admit Publicly (pastormatt.tv). While I don't share many of the feelings described in that particular article, the general tone of the article was something I have heard in the voice of every pastor I know at one point or another: emotional investment, for better or worse, with their congregations. In other words, most pastors take spiritual growth and decline in the churches they serve very personally. When a member of a church starts to come less frequently, falls into sin, or simply stops actively serving the Lord, a pastor should feel spiritually burdened for that individual. While the church may be growing overall, that one believer who is struggling will dominate the thoughts of the pastor.

When we turn to Hebrews 5:11, we find the sort of pastoral heart I have been describing. The author of Hebrews has challenged the believer to strive for God's promises, holding firm to the faith. The author has exalted Jesus Christ and shared the hope that all believers can have through His role as a High Priest: the privilege to draw near to God the Father with confidence. This ought to encourage the believer and cause him/her to rejoice in the Lord and grow spiritually. But when we turn to the eleventh verse we find that this

is not happening and because it is not happening, it is causing the author of Hebrews to grieve over the spiritual condition of the church to whom he is writing:

We have a lot to explain about this. But since you have become too lazy to pay attention, explaining it to you is hard. By now you should be teachers. Instead, you still need someone to teach you the elementary truths of God's word. You need milk, not solid food. All those who live on milk lack the experience to talk about what is right. They are still babies. However, solid food is for mature people, whose minds are trained by practice to know the difference between good and evil.

Let's make a few brief observations about this passage:

- 1.It reflects a pastor's heart. The author is deeply troubled by the church's lack of spiritual growth. They have been taught the truth, have access to God's very presence with confidence, but they aren't walking in that confidence.
- 2. The church was given a standard for spiritual growth. If I were to ask you, "What does it mean to be a mature Christian," would you be able to answer the question? This passage gave us two symptoms to watch for: a) Do you know the difference between right and evil? If the Holy Spirit is at work in your life and you are drawing closer to God through reading His Word, this is the basic level of maturity: you should be sensitive to righteousness. You should delight in it and hate what is evil. b) Do you train your mind through practice? Could you imagine what would happen to our country if we forced our military to exercise only during their basic training and then whenever they felt like it afterwards? It wouldn't take long for our military personnel to be greatly out of shape and our national security would be at risk. And yet, this is how the nominal Christian views spiritual disciplines (reading the Bible, praying, memorizing Scripture, tithing, sharing the Gospel, etc.) It is no wonder the enemy has been able to gain ground in our country. We need to be training our minds according to righteousness.
- 3. We need to ask where we are in our spiritual walks. It's time to take an evaluation of your heart. This passage, on the surface of it, is harsh. The church in Jerusalem was called lazy. None of us would appreciate someone writing to us and calling us that! What does the fruit of your life say about your walk with Jesus Christ? Are you growing in your faith? Are you praying more today than you were a year ago?

Encounter Tour

On Tuesday, February 12th I attended the Encounter Tour with guest speakers Levi Lusko & Lysa TerKeurst. Although it was a rainy night it didn't prevent a jam-packed audience at Amplify Church in Pittsburgh! The evening began with a live performance by Mack Brock. Levi spoke first with a thought- provoking message on the importance of how we speak to ourselves. He said we can't live positive lives if we always feed ourselves negative thoughts. He used the Psalms as an example of how David encouraged himself with the words he used. He spoke to himself using words which would refresh & remind him of the greatness of God & His love towards him. Levi used Ephesians 4:29, "Don't let any evil talk come out of your mouths. Say only what will help to build others up" to prompt us to think before we speak- asking is this word I'm about to say a gift? It would serve us all well to take alittle time to contemplate how we are speaking to ourselves & others. Our tongue & words have immense power in our lives & those around us. Let's use them to refresh each other & build each other up

The 2nd speaker of the evening was Lysa TerKeurst. For any of you who know me, you understand what a thrill this was for me! Lysa has had a major impact in my walk with the Lord. She has a way of saying things that speaks right to my heart, and she did not disappoint at this conference.

She talked about how we should use our feelings as "indicators" but not "dictators", and she used King Jehoshaphat to show us how. In 2 Chronicles 20 he receives word that a vast army of Moabites & Ammonites are

coming to battle against them. Upon hearing this verse 3 tells us, "Alarmed, Jehoshaphat resolved...", another words this news caused him to be alarmed, but it didn't dictate his reaction. This sudden new situation he was facing indicated he should be alarmed, but King Jehoshaphat was already resolved, or determined, he would take the situation to God. He wouldn't let his feelings clutter his reaction. He was resolved to seek God's help when situations arose that caused alarm.

We too are often alarmed by sudden life situations, but we must have a pre-determined mindset that, "I will trust God". A close daily walk with Him allows Him to prepare us THIS day for what He knows is coming THAT day. When THAT day comes we can cling to verse 12 of this chapter which says, "We have no power against this great multitude that is coming against us; nor do we know what to do, but our eyes are upon You." The great multitude coming against us may not be a vast army, but you fill in the situation. We've all faced great, vast, scary unknowns & when they come we must keep our eyes upon Jesus. We will steer where we stare. You can stare at the Fear or you can stare at His Faithfulness. Recount His faithful work in your life in the past & never take your eyes off The Master. He knows things you don't know. And remember there is always a meanwhile. Often God does His best work in the unseen, when it feels like He's doing nothing at all. When you don't know what else to do simply whisper the name of Jesus over & over again. And keep in mind your job is obedience. God's job is everything else.

For those familiar with how this battle for King Jehoshaphat ends you recall God has his army go out, move ahead while singing praises & declaring the beauty & holiness of the Lord. When they began to sing & praise, God set ambushes against the approaching armies & they were defeated! When King Jehoshaphat's army came to a place where they could overlook the wilderness there were nothing but dead bodies, no one from the approaching army had escaped! May we use this as an example to send our praises ahead of whatever great multitude is coming against us. God inhabits the praise of His people. Tho we may be alarmed let's also be people resolved to take our life situations to God & trust Him to handle them.
