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From the Desk of Pastor Chris •

What a Mighty God we serve!

In the absolute middle of nowhere, in between two hayfields on the border of North and South Dakota stands a marker that reads, "O Lord my God, Thou art very great." (Psalm 104:1b) It would seem, at first glance, that this marker would serve as the least appropriate way to express the glory of God. Most markers stand on the edge of something great, reminding those who pass by to take note of a great view, building, or former residence of a historical figure. But not this one. This marker is out of sight for most of the world: I trust that nobody who reads this will ever see it. It stands on the edge of a cemetery in which only a handful of saints-rural farmers from the beginning/middle of the last century are buried. It rests upon the location of a church that is no longer there. The building was moved to Aberdeen, SD (90 miles away) in 1959. There isn't a sign that honors the legacy of the church or the members who are buried near where it once stood. The cemetery doesn't even have a name.

The marker would serve as a perfect contrast to the 21st Century Church, whose primary concern too often is the ability to market itself. Too often, churches stretch to be the trendiest, newest, hottest ministries in their communities... drawing as much attention to their *brand* as possible. When churches aren't focused on their *brand*, too often they are focused on their preferences. Many churches have built entire identities around their preferences (I am not speaking of doctrinal differences, but of cultural preferences) and tragically, many more have split because of an overemphasis on self (Or a rejection of those who are not similar in one way or another).

But when we gather together, our emphasis should never be on ourselves. We aren't calling people to trust in our names, or to be ambassadors for our kingdoms... we should be calling people to respond in faith to the Lord Jesus Christ, and to glorify His great name. Ministries (And individual believers alike) must encourage people to live in awe of the glory of God.

A few Sundays ago, Tiza Dunaway asked me, during the meet and greet, to share a few words with our congregation. She stood up and shared, "You are looking at a miracle!" urging people to see the powerful work of God in her life. Just a few weeks before, Ed Warner shared about how the prayers of God's people had worked wonders in his life; giving him hope through his battle with cancer, and sharing how God answered those prayers through his physical healing. Those moments weren't about the significance of either individual (Although both are wonderful, godly people). Their testimonies were invitations for our congregation to see how wonderful, how powerful, and how loving our God is.

I trust that some of those who read this article have never met Ed or Tiza, just as you have never seen that marker on the border of the Dakotas. But the greatness of God is not displayed through people, or through places according to fame or earthly significance... but through the work God does through them. That little country church, where the marker now stands, sent out numerous pastors and at least one missionary: a man who served as a Bible translator in East Asia. People heard the Bible in their own language because of what God did through that little country church. If you drove past the field, you might completely miss it, but it is precious to God. I trust God's work through the testimonies of Ed and Tiza will likewise bear lasting fruit, perhaps in ways they will never see. Can I ask you, do you strive to point others to the God who is great or to yourself?

"O Lord my God, Thou art very great!"

Indian Creek Baptist Church Campground Ministry Thirty Fifth Anniversary at Yogi Bear's Jellystone Park - 2017

For thirty-five summers, Indian Creek Baptist Church has been holding Sunday "Campground Services" at the local "Mill Run Campground." It began in 1983 with Don Bowser and Gorman Dull taking turns as speaker from Memorial Day through Labor Day. In 1984, the pastor and some of the deacons were also recruited as speakers. The service consisted of singing a song, an opening prayer, several more songs chosen by the attendees, followed by a 15-20 minute devotional by the speaker, a closing song and closing prayer. This was all taking place at the end of the water slide with rushing water and a pool gurgling at the bottom. There was a little shelter there where shoes, towels and clothing could be stored and this provided some protection from the weather if it was raining. It wasn't the best location, but we all enjoyed being able to have a worship service at the campground. Eight years later in 1991, the campground built us a "chapel." Actually it is a picnic pavilion with a concrete floor and folding picnic tables, lights and is more centrally located in the campground. Compared to the water slide location, it represented a huge step up and we had our "chapel."

As the campground has grown (now Yogi Bear's Jellystone Park) so has our ministry. We have had people from all over the world including England, Central America, South America, Europe, and Japan. We have had visitors from a large number of states including Alaska and Hawaii. Our ministry now includes giving out Bibles, various literature, "The Ultimate Questions" booklet and "Our Daily Bread" booklet. For the children, we give out small toy gifts such as stuffed animals, Bible bookmarks, scripture pens, and more. The campground provides coffee and hot water for tea or hot chocolate.

Each week for the past four years, we have also been blessed to have a different volunteer speaker from Indian Creek Baptist Church. We are blessed to have so many who are willing to tell others of the Good News of Jesus. We have both men and women speakers. The age range for our speakers has been from 11 years old to 95 years of age, which is truly a tribute to our church and community. With God's help and blessing, Indian Creek Baptist will continue this unique service for many more years or until Jesus returns.

It was very fitting that Don Bowser should return to close out this anniversary year. Our attendance total for this year was 451--301 campers and 150 locals.

<u>Short-Term Mission Trip: July 16-22, 2017</u> <u>Gatlinburg, TN: Roaring Fork Baptist Church</u>

We were blessed to have the opportunity to partner with Builders for Christ on this mission trip. Builders for Christ is an organization "serving our Lord Jesus Christ in the mission field of church construction" by providing and coordinating volunteer labor to help churches build/rebuild their buildings.

The Builders for Christ Leadership Team organize and plan the mission trip for the construction project at the host church. Each week a new group of volunteers show up at the work site ready to provide their "free labor". Some volunteers take vacation time to be able to help, some are high school or college students and are already off in the summer, but many of the volunteers are retired.

Our church has had groups of volunteers partner with Builders for Christ in the past: 2003 in Aurora, CO; 2004 in Manchester, CT; 2005 in Sterling, MA; 2006 in Eau Claire, WI; 2007 in Chalmette, LA; 2008 in Logan, OH.

This year we went to Gatlinburg, TN to help rebuild Roaring Fork Baptist Church, a church that burned down in the November 2016 wildfires that devastated the Pigeon Forge and Gatlinburg area, including parts of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. The construction project also included building a huge Family Life Center across the street from the church. Our group spent most of our time in the Center doing insulation (including in the peaks of some pretty high ceilings) and dry wall. Some of us also did insulation in rooms in the church basement, helped in the work in the sanctuary, and manned the "Tool Trailer" (distributing various tools to the volunteers). Our work day began at 7a.m. and ended at 5 p.m.

We worked with other volunteer groups from OH, TN, and AL. The group from Tuscaloosa, AL was the largest and they were in charge of the kitchen. Their cooks were responsible for preparing lunch and supper for all of us (around 150 people) each day, as well as morning and afternoon snacks. We were well-fed, for sure!

The group from our church included the following: Pastor Chris, Amy, Isaiah & Elijah, Hope & Brian Dull, Vicki & John Tressler, Carol Hull, Wendy, Earl, Bailey & Dara Pritts, Mike Bigam, Shawn Depaoli, and Sharon & Julie Weible.

Our group started each day with prayer together before leaving for the worksite and then prayer at the worksite with the whole group of volunteers. There was time for sight-seeing in the evenings (for anyone who had the energy left to do so) and for fellowship. Our last workday (Friday) ended at lunchtime. That afternoon we went as a group to the Christ in the Smokies Museum & Gardens and then to the Applewood Farmhouse Restaurant for a great meal.

It was sad, but interesting to see the areas that had burned in the wildfires: a house/building would be burned, but one across the street or even beside it would be okay! It was also interesting to see black bears several times, including in the pavilion where we ate our meals (ask Julie about the Mama Bear & her twin

cubs)!
