From the Desk of Pastor Chris

"Resurrection is a fiction and a distraction to anyone who refuses to face the reality of death." -Christian Wiman, Poet, Critic, and Seminary Professor

When Wiman wrote those words, he didn't write from the perspective of an unbeliever. He wasn't suggesting that resurrection is, in fact, a fiction. Nor did he write those words as though facing the reality of death is a trivial exercise. Christian Wiman is dying and has been for more than ten years. He has been diagnosed with a rare cancer that has gone into remission, likely to return. He simply doesn't know when.

When he began his battle with cancer, his faith had been dormant for many years. Upon his diagnosis, he began to wrestle with a question everyone ought to seriously consider: *do I believe in resurrection?* Sure, the believer can easily reply with a resounding "Yes!" But I'd ask, do you live as though you do? Have you seriously wrestled with the reality of death?

I think we understand, but often try not to think of, the reality that our flesh will grow frail and then fail. But understanding the limitations of this body should encourage the believer: this body is only a seed. What will be planted will be transformed into that which is imperishable, incorruptible, and eternal. When we begin to consider this hope, we understand just how little power death holds over us. It does not have victory over us: those who die are not overcome by death- they are released from

its touch. This should give us confidence in the midst of life's greatest trials and hope in the midst of suffering. Job, expressing this hope, said:

I know that my redeemer lives, and that in the end he will stand on the earth. And after my skin has been destroyed, yet in my flesh I will see God; I myself will see him with my own eyes-I and not another. How my heart years within me! (Job 19:25-27)

Christians do not face the second death (eternal damnation in the lake of fire), even if they submit to the first (natural death). Christians do die twice though. When we are regenerated by the Holy Spirit at conversion, we are made dead to sin. In other words, we are no longer slaves to sin- we are free to choose to live for Christ. Further, the eternal consequences of sin have been removed; washed by the blood of the Lamb. Romans 6 puts it this way:

For if we have been united with Him in a death like His, we will certainly also be united with him in a resurrection like His. For we know that our old self was crucified with Him so that the body ruled by sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves to sin- because anyone who has died has been set free from sin... In the same way, count yourselves dead to sin but alive to God in Christ Jesus

We can say we believe in resurrection, but if we don't live as though we have been raised to walk in newness of life; that we are dead to sin, then we treat resurrection like a distraction. It becomes another cute topic likes sports, the weather, or crafts. But this cannot be so for the believer. We are commanded to count ourselves dead to sin. We will wrestle with temptation and sin, but we are called to crucify those with our flesh. We will find ourselves pursuing temporary, carnal things- but we are called walk in freedom; for which Christ has set us free (Gal. 5:1). This isn't a suggestion, and it isn't self-help advice: it is the acknowledgement of what the Lord has promised to do through you. As you walk this earth, I would urge you to live as though the resurrection power is in work within you (Eph. 1:19-20). And when He calls you home, to leave behind a legacy that points others away from a full coffin and towards an empty tomb.

Greetings from Mill Run and Thank You

We are still rejoicing in God's faithfulness to us, as we celebrated in June, the 175 years of Baptist worship here. The first record of Baptist worship in the 'Indian Creek Settlement' (the former name for Mill Run) is that in 1798 the Turkeyfoot Baptist Church sent its pastors here to institute worship. We have no records that it continued permanently, so we count 1843 as our official beginning. We were happy to hear that the historic church building where the congregation of Turkeyfoot Baptist Church ('Old Jersey Church') met, is unlocked once a year for a worship service. The congregation now worship in the town of Confluence. Marlyn and I attended the service Aug. 12th. A musical was presented by Danny Conner and the Men of Grace Quartet. They were wonderful. Three pastors in attendance led prayers.

We knew from records that the original founders of the church in 1775 were very patriotic. When the Revolution of the colonies began, several of the men left their families and farms and returned to New Jersey to enlist. Among them was my ancestor, Robert Colborn. When we explored the interior of the old building, we discovered that the congregation continued in patriotism. There is a plaque from the Dept. of the Army, dated 1942, thanking the congregation for relinquishing their pastor to serve as Army chaplain. He was Rev. Moore-head.

The old building, constructed in 1877, was the 3rd on the site. There is a plaque on the exterior designating it as the first Baptist church congregation west of the Alleghenies. It was very well built and is maintained well. It is located at 2516 Jersey Hollow Road, Confluence,

PA. 15424. Next summer the service will be Aug 11th, 7:00P.M.
